Seashell Sissolving Experiment

The seashell dissolving experiment is a simple ocean science experiment that demonstrates the chemical reaction between the shell's material and the acid in the vinegar.

What is your Hypothesis? What will happen to the shell?

- Make pictures of things that start with the letters C, O, Q and G in their picture dictionary books.




Sight Words

Sight words are a collection of words that children are taught to recognize without sounding out the letters. They are common, frequently used, foundational words that a child can use to build reading comprehension. We began to introduce these words to the children in February. Moving forward, we will be including these words on your monthly Teacher's calendar. We encourage you to work on these at home with your child. Simply sitting with your child and writing the words out and repeating them in sentences is a great way to encourage recognition. In school, the children will be doing different fun activities to go along with each sight word that is introduced. Look for the finished worksheets in your child's take-home folder.
